


Ellie helps Great Aunt Betsi www. Ο

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
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A trip to Rudry in the school holidays was also always

by the fire and exploring a fairy tale castle.



"I thought the doctor had given you some tablets. Aren't they making you feel better Auntie?" asked Susan.




Ellie and Mags were in the middle of a jigsaw when they heard a loud bang and Susan shouting "ouch" downstairs.

"Shall I help you pick them up?" Ellie was always keen to be helpful.



"Oh yes dear but something woke me up" Great Aunt Betsi replied.



"There's rather a lot Auntie, and most of them seem to be the same medicine" said Susan.


"Well they gave me some in some silly bottles that I couldn't open so I told the nurse. The next lot came in boxes" replied Betsi.

The pharmacist's name was Martin. Susan found him very helpful.





Susan, Ellie and Mags had listened very carefully to what Martin told them.






